
Writing a Good Beginning to a Narrative 101






A story can begin in different ways. Whatever the beginning, it must catch the readers' attention and make them want to read on.



A boring beginning may result in a reader not reading whatever the author has written. Without the reader reading, the story may as well be untold.




This essay is torture!

Start with details about the setting.

Start with details about the setting.

Start with an action.

Start with an action.


Uncle Hal arrived in the night with three boards. This was after Uncle Allan had moved us to New Street,....

You have to be kidding me!!




Start in the middle or at the end of the plot.
